1. What do you see as the top three issues facing the City of Tuscaloosa? How should those issues be addressed?

1 Financial Stability

We must begin living within our means. If we keep borrowing money depending on the 1 cent sales tax to cover it we may be in for some hard times. We borrowed \$60 million last year and are discussing more borrowing. We can't go on living beyond our means.

2 Gun violence and Crime in our community

As a city government we must continue to support our police. Equipment and supplies are important, but the officers on the street needs to be confident our city government has their back. Continued training such as the new unit dealing with Mental Health issues is essential as is keeping up with pay to keep our best officers from leaving for greener pastures. There are no simple answers, but we need to work together as a community so we all have a safer place to live.

3 As I have talked with so many voters in my district one thing is clear. They want someone to listen to their issues. They do not expect everything to be solved immediately, they understand that often there are no simple answers. But they do not want to be taken for granted. Many feel that our city government has been unresponsive to the average person. As one resident said, it shouldn't matter what district you live in as to how quick or if you get services. We must earn the trust of people in Tuscaloosa.

2. Downtown Tuscaloosa has experienced significant growth in recent years, adding hotels, residences, restaurants, and retail. In your view, what needs to be done to build on that momentum?

We need to make sure that the people using these venues feel safe. Occasional gun violence can not be tolerated. Our police can work with merchants and get their take on what needs to be done to keep this area safe and encourage customers and residents of the downtown area to continue to use all the opportunities in that area. We must insist on keeping the streets clean and attractive. We need to be careful that we don't return to the days of dozens of business front closed down in the downtown district.

3. There is significant community interest in recruiting knowledge-based industries to Tuscaloosa to provide local employment opportunities for the best and brightest graduates of our institutions of higher education. What is your view of how this goal can be achieved?

I have been a big believer in working with the University of Alabama to solve problems. There are people on campus that can help with strategies for this and other projects. We may not ever compete with Silicon Valley, but we can give opportunities to those in our community. Shelton State Community College has a terrific Technology program and could easily be a participant in this.

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4. There is public discussion about a large sports/recreation complex being developed on the former McFarland Mall site. What is your view on this proposed development and should public funds be used to invest in the project?

The area around exit 73 has been the subject of much debate. While it's easy to see the old Mall site as an eyesore, it's not the only problem. We need to consider the surrounding area. I support the idea of a sports complex and would like to see a hotel with it. I would rather see private funds used but giving those that might invest in the area tax abatements could be a consideration.

5. What is your vision for parks and recreation in Tuscaloosa and what role should the Tuscaloosa County Park and Recreation Authority (PARA) play?

I believe in PARA and the roll they have played. I have seen it begin in an old school on 15th Street and become something very important in our community. I believe we should continue to partner with Tuscaloosa County. We have ignored the needs of Bowers park maintenance for too long and I strongly support keeping the therapy pool at the McAbee center. With help PARA could host even more statewide events that help make Tuscaloosa a destination city.

6. What is your position on Elevate Tuscaloosa? Do you believe Elevate Tuscaloosa funds should remain separated from general funds and used for the types of projects initially discussed, subject to customary review, need, and design requirements?

How could anyone not want to elevate Tuscaloosa as a city we can be proud of. So far District 6 has received nothing in return for our part of the tax. I'm glad for the rest of the city but there are needs in our district, that may be a possibility as we go forward. As for mixing the funds into the general fund, if we keep borrowing as we are currently doing we will have to really consider what is essential for our city. If the day comes we can't take care of basic needs we won't have an option but to mix the funds.

7. Do you support efforts and city funding to pursue commercial air service for Tuscaloosa? Why or why not?

Having local service would be a good idea. I have some questions about it. First, we know it would be more costly to fly from Tuscaloosa than Birmingham. Would the convenience be worth the cost of a ticket? I think it's worth looking into as I'm sure the University and local businesses might be helped, but we don't need to jump in too quick, especially if it means more spending by our city government to support the flights.

8. The city has multiple budgets, the five largest being the General Fund Operating, General Fund Reserve, Water/Sewer Operating, Water/Sewer Reserve, and Elevate Tuscaloosa. How should each of these be utilized and managed?

We have great department heads in Tuscaloosa. We need to utilize their experience and skills and not micromanage the departments or employees. The council members should work with various department heads to solve problems in their districts.

9. What are the areas of city operations that you think you can bring any special knowledge or expertise? Why are those areas important to you?

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I spent 45 years of my life working in law enforcement. When I retired as a Captain at the Tuscaloosa Police Department, I became the Director of the Tuscaloosa County Juvenile Detention Facility. I worked for a private company contracting with the County Commission for 20 years. Over my life time I have gained a great deal of knowledge concerning Public Safety. I worked closely with the Fire Department Investigating Suspicious Fires. I worked with several Mental Health agencies and Social Workers investigating crimes against children. I know something about keeping our city safe. At the County Juvenile Detention Facility, I learned that private business can often make things happen quicker and more efficiently than government. I will bring all this experience to the Council.

10. What is your vision for the City of Tuscaloosa in 10 years? How will you, in your role as an elected official, help make that vision a reality?

I want to see Tuscaloosa known for more than the University of Alabama. I want this community known as a safe place to visit. A place where people can come for an education but also a place where their families will be safe and have an opportunity to be physically and financially secure. I want our schools to be safe. Without safe, well run schools we will not attract industry. I would like to see our community beautified as it grows and not have pockets of industry or decaying businesses here people are afraid to travel. I care about all of Tuscaloosa. Whatever happens in one part of our community effects all of us. Because I truly care, I will use my experience and judgment to see that Tuscaloosa is a great place to raise a family and live your life.
